


Total Number of Incidents

Additional Detective

In October 2023, the Criminal Investigations Division (CID) experienced a significant development with the addition of Detective Shawn Parks. Detective Parks, a lateral hire from the Loveland Police Department, brought valuable experience and expertise to the Criminal Investigations Division, complementing the existing team led by Detective Brittany Huelsman. Detective Shawn Parks joined our agency in April 2022, following a commendable tenure as a Detective with the Loveland Police Department. With this experience, Detective Parks brought a wealth of knowledge and skills to his new role.

Throughout 2023, Detectives Huelsman and Parks participated in various training courses to enhance their investigative skills. These initiatives underscored the department's commitment to continuous improvement and professional development. By staying abreast of the latest investigative techniques, legal protocols, and technological advancements, Detectives Parks and Huelsman positioned themselves as proactive investigators, better equipped to handle complex cases and emerging challenges.

In 2023, CID investigated 102 cases, with felony thefts emerging as the highest reported crime. Of the 45 theft cases forwarded for further investigation, 33 were successfully closed with a positive resolution. The remaining nine cases remain open as of January 1, 2024, reflecting ongoing efforts to bring closure to outstanding matters. The predominant types of theft reported include Gift Card Scams, Bail Bondsman Scams, Counterfeit Money Scams, and Facebook Rental Scams, highlighting the diverse nature of criminal activities encountered by the Criminal Investigative Division.

Despite their diligent efforts, 14 cases from 2023 remain pending due to various factors. The Criminal Investigative Division continues to prioritize these cases, employing a systematic approach to address each pending matter effectively. The addition of Detective Shawn Parks, coupled with the commitment to ongoing training and skill development, has strengthened the investigative capabilities of the Criminal Investigations Division within the Hamilton Township Police Department. The department will continue to adapt and innovate, ensuring its investigative efforts remain responsive to evolving criminal dynamics and community needs.


Patrol Division

2023 was an exciting year for the patrol division of Hamilton Township. The addition of two officers during the year aided in providing the level of service our residents and visitors have come to expect. Patrol officers spent a great deal of time proactively enforcing laws, which has resulted in numerous illegal firearm seizures and countless narcotic arrests. These arrests range from the recovery of stolen firearms to using weapons while under disability (i.e., felon, drug dependent, highly intoxicated). Narcotic complaints have continued to be a focus for the patrol division and have resulted in numerous arrests for methamphetamine, heroin, fentanyl, and psilocybin.

Training has been a critical component of the agency's professionalism, and 2023 was no exception. Officers completed numerous in-house and local training hours to continue building the knowledge required for the ever-changing and evolving skills necessary to perform law enforcement effectively.
